Thinking Out Loud With Pastor Josh

I learned at a very early age that "salad" at a Lutheran meal almost never means lettuce, sprouts, or anything that had leaves. It means jello molds and coleslaw and that stuff that looks kinda like green pistachio dip and is really only served at church potlucks.

For some of us who have grown up in our Midwest Lutheran tradition, or have been to a church potluck in the rural Midwest, this might be familiar. A table full of crock pots and roasting pans straining the very limits of one poor circuit breaker while another table is overflowing with brownies, sheet cakes, cookies, and pies. The coffee is always on, and there's probably milk for those few (like me!) who prefer it as a meal beverage.

When I visited a friend leading an historic Black Lutheran church, I stayed for their potluck. They had everything they grew up expecting at church. Bountiful trays of chicken pieces, BBQ pork, mac-n-cheese, various prepared greens, rice, black eyed peas, hot sauce, plenty of pop, and enough pies to feed a small city.

Which of these two meals sounds more Lutheran?

This is one, very small reason we acknowledge and lift up Black History Month at Trinity. Each of us, including me, can define expectations by our experiences, like what will be served at a Lutheran potluck. Even the idea of what "Lutheran" is can be shaped by our ethnicity. For many of us, our white northern European heritage becomes the model of church we describe. Even if the oldest Lutheran churches in the US are Black, and one of our growing Lutheran populations in the US is Latine.

We'll challenge ourselves throughout February to keep remembering that our idea of God's kingdom (and church potlucks) can be infinitely wider than our experiences in white Midwest churches. This remembering will broaden our vision of who are God's people. Some of the stories of Black and brown Lutherans will be painful and difficult. Some confession and forgiveness will be required. Yet every story is meant to break us open, shatter our expectations, and give thanks to God that God's glory is greater than what we know.



Black History Month

Trinity has honored Black History Month through adjustments in our worship language, making resources available, and intentional study. Pastor Josh is seeking interest in renewing a study group to read and discuss books on racial justice. The first book we'll read is <u>A Rumor of Black Lutherans</u> by Rev. Dr. James Thomas. It's a quick look at ten Black church leaders from American Lutheran history who followed Christ's call amidst slavery, Jim Crow, and significant resistance from the wider Lutheran church. It's an important set of stories to remind us that being Lutheran is not as linear, or narrowly ethnic, as we have often assumed.

Congregations and members of the Northern Illinois Synod will gather March 22 under the theme: "Growing Disciples."



This event will run 8:30 a.m. to 3:45 p.m. with opening prayer beginning at 9:30. We will have

time to hear from Bishop Stacie Fidlar. Our guest speakers are from ELCA Innovation. They will provide an engaging presentation titled, "Innovation Starts with Empathy." Together, we will explore how cultivating empathy can transform ministry and help leaders grow as disciples who make disciples. Using real-world examples and practical insights, we will:

- Illustrate how getting to know your community and actively listening to their needs lays a foundation for new ministry experiments.
- Highlight how connecting with others builds trust and opens pathways for collaboration.
- Discuss how reflecting on vitality and aligning our capacity and assets with community needs fosters sustainable and meaningful engagement.

Participants will leave inspired and equipped to approach their ministries with fresh perspectives rooted in empathy and connection.

Following lunch, we will have time for two workshops hosted by both lay and rostered members of our synod. Many presenters are here on behalf of a synod committee or a ministry of the ELCA. Others are providing innovative ideas that they have practiced in their context. These workshops will be experiential and a time for sharing resources.
